

### **CHAIRMAN'S REPORT TO THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 14 MAY 2014**

I have reflected on what has happened in this last year and realise that the Parish Council have had to work extremely hard to try to represent the village of Normandy in all of its five hamlets. Who would have thought that the very things that irritate us as a settlement village, our lack of services, no shops, no pub, no comprehensive travelling system will have served us as arguments against the Borough Council's proposals to put 2,000 to 3,000 of the houses they want over the next five years in the greenbelt around our village. The fight goes on.

The Parish Council has arranged a number of meetings both within the village and with others in order to test views, galvanise support and contribute to the overall debate but protesting on behalf of those of us who live in the greenbelt area surrounding Guildford. It is not just Normandy that is under attack; Worplesdon and Send are having to deal with huge numbers of housing that will increase the size of their settlements substantially. At least, they have some infrastructure before they start.

Despite the fact that having corrected the Borough's assessment of Normandy and Flexford, we now appear much lower down in the hierarchy of what is described by 'sustainability' the Borough Council's contractors have glibly referred to the fact that as part of the development the Borough Council could provide money for shops and other services. So having lived for years without it, we can possibly get it if we give in to their evil plans for the development of suburbia

Those of you who have read the documentation we have placed on our website and which has been sent to the Borough Council as part of the consultation prior to the production of draft reports of local plan, will know that we have worked hard to put our evidence in place. All of that has been taken into account and yet the Borough Council still seem determined to place housing in Normandy and the reason for that is their desire to expand on the economic success around the university and research park near the hospital. There is a huge demand and need for key-workers. I am told that of the 500 nurses the Royal Surrey County Hospital trained in the last few years only a few have stayed to work in the area because of the cost of housing and the like. Obviously that is an issue but we are a university town and the university has done very little to provide accommodation on its own substantive plot. Cheaper housing around Guildford Park and Westborough has been taken up by students and yet that is ideally placed for young couples and key-workers or indeed anybody who wants to travel to London.

We have a long haul ahead of us and the only way we can fight back in my view is by trying to seek to have some of those areas designated as conservation areas. The only comfort we can take is the published intention to use the land in our village as some sort of backup if other tracts of land fail to become available. That in truth is no comfort at all because we will still have lost our green belt protection

Pirbright is a **Conservation Area** based in part on the fact that Lord Pirbright lived at Henley Park which you may remember is in Normandy!!! They make much of the fact that they are next to the SSSI that runs along the Pirbright Road but that too lies in

Normandy. The SSSI is also part of and protected under the Thames Basin Heaths Special Protection Area. This is an important habitat and there is a planning strategy document which requires LAs to insist on ecological survey information being provided. All these 'protections' fall away into nothing when accepted risk strategies are adopted. We have to achieve some other sort of permanent protection beyond that which the label 'green belt' has traditionally provided

The benefit of being a Conservation Area to Pirbright is that the status gained prevents excessive development. We have a number of small conservation areas across Normandy Common and of course the churchyard. Your Parish Council is commissioning an assessment by the Surrey Wildlife Trust in order to help us to manage the common but also to try and find out what species of flora and fauna can be found there. It surely follows that if our Village Pond is a Special Nature Conservation Area that the rest of the common must also be pretty fab! We have Ancient Woodlands at Pusseys Copse but not even this has excluded it from the proposed development area.

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The Parish Council has encouraged and supported the formation of a Wildlife Working Group who it is hoped will meet to gather information about what lives alongside us in Normandy and I am grateful to the Normandy Historians for

providing me with a copy of a list of all those Grade I and Grade II listed buildings that we have in our area.

I think there is a potential to argue for about 3 separate Conservation Areas in Normandy

We do need volunteers however if we are to go down this path. I have in mind that there should be three areas of conservation:-

1. Across Normandy Common.
2. The land facing Westwood Place (which is Grade II listed).
3. Around the Flax Pond at Flexford which is a Grade I.

If there is anybody here who is interested in their area and is willing to become involved in drafting documentation to support this then do please come forward.

Enough said about our struggle with the local plan.

You will hear reports from each of the Parish Councillors who have taken on responsibility for aspects of village life and the running of the Parish Council. We work together as a team. Each of us values the other's strengths and we try each to make up for each other's weaknesses.

We run a hugely successful bonfire with the help of volunteers. It is becoming more and more successful as each year goes past but we still need more volunteers to assist us to replace those who leave. Parents with teenage children are encouraged to apply!

With regard to our Fete this is just getting bigger and better, providing a wonderful fund raising opportunity for our clubs and charities as well as our few employers.

*Last year the Councillors felt that we had done more than we would be able to do again and by this I mean we were completely exhausted.*

I am grateful to Nick Norton who is our number cruncher and researcher and who has provided us with the information we need in order to make representations on your behalf for the local plan. .... quite apart from his technical skills and IT ability which again has assisted us throughout the year. I am also grateful to our husband and wife team, Alan and Val Cheeseman, not only for their amazing energy but the fact they seem to know everything and everyone in Normandy. Alan of course is the Chair of the Land Management Working Party, whose knowledge regarding trees and wildlife has added massively to the quality of the decision making of the Parish Council. Not before time Darryl Taylor for his commitment to planning and his determination to put in a presence at as many planning appeals as he can.

I also thank David Simmonds for his efforts at Manor Fruit Farm and of course as you know he continues to work hard in support of the Normandy Youth Club although that is not associated with the Parish Council.

Finally, a number of residents this year were put forward for the Mayor's Award by the Parish Council and were successful in

obtaining them ...quite rightly so. Bill and Jill Stanworth for their work on the Traditional Orchard on the common. Brian Starkey for his commitment to the Village Pond and of course as you know he is a trustee of the Therapy Garden and Alfie Gregory who at every outdoor event for the Parish Council and indeed for the church provides children's amusements but also the power cables and other infrastructure such as the ramp which he knocked up to allow the classic cars to display behind the Village Hall this year without losing their chassis.

I suppose I also have to thank our clerk whose advice is still appreciated by each one of the Parish Councillors who sit before you; whose efforts, connections and knowledge have allowed the Parish Council to make use amongst other things of the Community Service Payback Scheme in such a manner as to have saved us tens of thousands of pounds over the year. 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### 1914 WW1 CENTENARY 1918 NORMANDY VILLAGE COMMEMORATION EVENTS

Normandy has a very special programme

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of forthcoming events to commemorate the WW1 Centenary. During meetings with local clubs, associations and St Mark's Church ideas were discussed and from these discussions a varied series of activities have evolved. Hopefully there will be something for everyone. Normandy Parish Council hope to plant a **Peace Garden** on Manor Fruit Farm, an area of beautiful plants, roses and decorative shrubs. There will be a stone memorial with suitable plaque and a bench to enable people to sit quietly and reflect.

The **programme of events** will start with a **special service at St Mark's Church** on 3<sup>rd</sup> August commencing at 5pm. The **Village Fête** on August Bank Holiday Monday, 25<sup>th</sup> August will have a special **WW1 theme** and it is hoped that stall holders, participants and visitors will dress appropriately, if possible. Some activities and competitions will reflect the theme.

On 11<sup>th</sup> November 2014 there will be a special **Remembrance Service and Party** at the War Memorial and the Royal British Legion Hall for the children in **Years 5 and 6 at Wyke Primary School.**

On 21<sup>st</sup> June 2015 in the Village Hall there will be a special **exhibition of work by Normandy Artists.** There will also be an exhibition of **photographs, and relevant items** relating to WW1 presented by the **Normandy Historians.** The **Village Fête**

in 2015 will include a **photographic display and art exhibition by Normandy Youth Club**, which will have reference to times of conflict. The Youth Club will also be presenting evenings of **themed poetry and story reading** as part of the Village programme. In **October 2015 the Normandy Players** will be staging a **production** illustrating life during times of war. **Normandy Football Club** will re-enact the **historic football match** played on Christmas Day 1914. The match will be on **16<sup>th</sup> December 2017**. It will be a fun event for families with a barbecue, hot and cold drinks, stalls and games and will offer something for all age groups.

Our final event of this Commemoration Programme is a **Grand Concert** to be held in the **Village Hall on 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> November 2018**. The Farnborough Royal British Legion Band, The Aldershot Military Wives Choir and the Rushmoor Male Voice Choir will be entertaining us with music and song. ### **HELP WITH COMMUNITY SERVICE WORKERS**

All readers of the Villager must have noticed all the ditch clearance (which has reduced flooding), tree coppicing and general clean up that has been carried out around the Village over the last year. All at no cost to the Village tax payers. The Community workers are in Normandy almost every Saturday and Sunday supervised by Probation Service Officers.

However volunteers are required to meet them, conduct them to where they have their breaks and serve them tea, coffee and biscuits which of course are provided by the Parish Council, and, explain to the Probation Officer supervisor the work that they are scheduled to do that day. How long does it take? The guys arrive sometime between 9 and 10 o'clock. You direct them to the tea and coffee facility, serve tea and coffee, liaise with the Probation Officer about their break times show the work to be undertaken, serve their tea and coffee at break times, clear up and return the victuals to the Parish Clerk which takes a maximum of about 4 hours each time. All the arrangements are made by the Parish Clerk who will deliver the coffee, tea, keys etc to you the day before you are on duty. At the moment it is all done by the Parish Clerk, Parish Councillors and a couple of non Council volunteers.
