



Chairman's welcome



Welcome to the latest edition of The Villager. On behalf of the Parish Council, I wish you all a (belated) Happy New Year.

2024 has started with more of a squelch than a bang. The recent rainfall may not necessarily be unprecedented but there has still been a considerable amount of rain over a brief period. Your Parish Council is not responsible for drains or drainage, but we do work on your behalf to bring local flooding issue to the attention of the relevant authorities. Issues with potholes, footpaths and drains can be reported directly to Surrey County Council and contact details can be found on their website.

Every four to six months we host a Flood Forum which is chaired by Jonathon Lord, our local MP. We have representatives attending from various interested

organisations, including Guildford Council, Surrey County Council, Thames Water, and they are pressed for action plans to address the most serious issues. Residents are invited to attend if they have issues with flooding or surface water drainage. The next meeting is scheduled for early April.

We are still finalising plans for village events during the year but one event that is fixed for our calendar is the "D Day" 80th anniversary commemoration on 6th June. There will be a ceremony in the evening which will include lighting the beacon at Manor Fruit Farm. More details will be published nearer the date, along with details of other events in our calendar. We have also set dates for the annual Parish Assembly and the November Bonfire. More details of the planned events will be found within the newsletter.

Unfortunately, we have received a notice of resignation from Councillor Dabeer Ahmed. Dabeer has moved house and therefore no longer qualifies to be a councillor within Normandy. We thank him for his time and effort over the past eighteen months.

Report it: Overgrown hedges

Spring often brings a surge in plant growth, and while it's wonderful to have so much greenery, it's important to be mindful of potential issues it can create.

Surrey County Council plays a crucial role in maintaining the safety and accessibility of our shared spaces, so reporting any problems related to highways, verges, and pavements is definitely the right thing to do. Here are some specific examples of what you might report to Surrey County Council:

- Overgrown hedges or trees that are obstructing the highway or pavement, causing visibility problems or making it difficult for pedestrians to pass.
- Damaged or uneven pavements that could pose a tripping hazard.
- Weeds or vegetation growing on or close to the road, which could obscure road markings or signs.
- Blocked drains or gullies that could lead to flooding during heavy rain.



By reporting these issues, you're helping to ensure that everyone in our village can enjoy our beautiful surroundings safely and conveniently. You can report problems directly through Surrey County Council's website: Tell us about a tree, hedge, grass or weed issue - Surrey County Council (surreycc.gov.uk) or by calling their customer service line on 0300 200 1004.

Volunteer spotlight!

What do you do to volunteer for the council?

My first volunteering activity was bonfire building in 2012, which was brilliant fun, and is still my favourite task. Since then, I have been involved with setting up and packing down various events including summer fairs, Coronation celebrations, Wander Fest, etc - usually wrestling with the infamous large marquee, gazebos and flags!

have also done tree planting, litter picking, conservation work and helped decorate the Christmas tree. Additionally, I tend two noticeboards regularly updating them with Council notifications.

How long have you been volunteering?

I moved to Normandy in 2011 during my last year serving as an Army musician at Deepcut and have been volunteering for 12 years now, being semi-retired.

Why do you volunteer?

Since transferring to the Army Reserves, still as a musician, I can fit in volunteering around my other activities and hobbies, hopefully for the good and benefit of the community.

I can often be seen running or cycling around the local area or performing on bass trombone in the St Mark's Church band once a month and the Surrey Police Band concerts throughout the year at our regular 'home venue' Normandy Village Hall, where I also play badminton weekly.

It is always great to see other volunteers, friends and acquaintances out and about, or especially, in the audience at concerts.

It is a good feeling to be part of this village community.



Normandy Conservation Volunteers were set up in 2023 to help manage the wilder parts of Normandy Parish Council's owned and managed land.

So what do we do and why do we do it?

The following are some of the projects we have tackled this winter:-

- a) Clearing rhododendron from Normandy Common. Rhododendron is not a native species in the UK so not many animals use it for food or shelter. In addition, it grows so dense that it stops other native plants from growing under or near it. To improve biodiversity on the common, we aim to clear all the rhododendron and then monitor what other plants grow in its place.
- b) Clearing brambles and other plants from around the planted hedge by the Normandy Therapy Garden on Manor Fruit Farm. The brambles cause a problem for the Therapy Garden as they grow through the fence and mean that the clients cannot use that area. This is why the Council planted the trees. Now we need to make sure that the brambles do not return.
- c) Increasing the clear-water area on Normandy Pond. Whilst some reeds and water plants are great for wildlife, having clear open water is also important. If we do not manage the reeds and edge plants, then they will gradually take over the whole pond. So we do a bit at a time, making sure there is always some cover for pond wildlife.
- d) Cutting back scrub on the sides of the Permissive Horse Ride on Normandy Common. The brambles, bracken and other scrub have grown up a lot in the last few years making the path narrower. Clearing these scrubby plants back will widen the path and also let other plants, including wildflowers, have a chance of growing. Regular monitoring will help us discover what other plants grow along this path.

We run monthly work parties to do conservation work and through the summer will be doing wildlife surveys as well, working closely with Friends of Normandy Wildlife.

There is always room for more volunteers.

You don't need experience, just enthusiasm! If cutting, digging and physical work is not for you, then we are also looking for people who are interested in helping with surveys, promotion and communication and fundraising.

However, if you do have experience and/or specific knowledge, please do come and share it with us!

What's in a name?"

Sometimes, an ordinary road or street name can have a remarkable background and for me, this point is clearly demonstrated when a local small housing development has been named HALIFAX CLOSE - much to many people's surprise as Guildford is nowhere near the Yorkshire town of that name.

The new name, marking the new houses in 'Fairlands,' notes the night of the 10th of March 1941 when a brand new Halifax RAF Bomber crashed nearby, killing four airmen with two somehow surviving.

The Halifax Bomber was a brand new aircraft and had been delivered to 35 Squadron, a Pathfinder force that was based at Gravely in Cambridgeshire as the replacement aircraft for their ageing Wellingtons. It was one of the first 'four engined' aircraft and was quite unproven at that stage of the War. On this 10th of March night, three of the new aircraft were briefed to fly down south over England, then cross the Channel to try and bomb the docks area of Le Havre in Normandy in occupied Europe.

The airmen selected for this trip regarded this sortie as rather a 'Milk run' - a try out journey over the sea. On the night they managed to reach their target in France, all dropped their bombs in the target area and they turned for home - quite pleased with the performance of their new airplanes.

Trouble hit them with a vengeance when, in the early hours of the 11th of March, they had reached the Hog's Back area and just an hour from their base of safety. They were spotted by a RAF Beaufighter on patrol from Tangmere in Sussex ... in the darkness their crew caught up with one of the Halifax Bombers and, not recognising the aircraft, presumed it was a German Intruder and they opened fire - causing, deadly damage and starting a fire in the body of the Bomber. Many of the residents of Wanborough and Normandy Villages

Many of the residents of Wanborough and Normandy Villages heard the noise of the battle in the sky and saw the burning Halifax begin it's descent. It eventually crashed into the trees by the Fairlands Garage. It had begun to break up and the Pilot, Squadron Leader Peter Gilchrist, was thrown out of his cockpit and managed to open his parachute and land safely nearby. Sergeant Pedy also managed to get out and also survived but Sergeant Lucas, Sergeant Broadhurst, Pilot Officer Rolfe-Ararnd and Flying-Officer Cooper all perished in the crash of this Halifax, Number EL9489.

A few years afterwards when I moved to this area I was able to pinpoint for an investigating group the exact spot where the Bomber had crashed and burnt out. Their 'digs' actually found and retrieved

two of the aircraft's engines buried deep in the ground. Subsequently, a small memorial stone was erected to mark the spot, recording the incident and the names of the crew.

Squadron Leader Gilchrist, after his astonishing escape, went on to become one of the most famous of the Pathfinder's Force and survived his operational tours to the end of the War.

After the tragedy in 1941 there was a Board of Inquiry set up to see why one of our Beaufighters had brought down the Halifax. In the end it was recorded as 'friendly fire' and endorsed as an unfortunate case of mis-identification. There is no record of how the Beaufighter's crew had reacted to their mistake but their feelings can well be imagined.

Finally Gaynor White, Worplesdon

Parish Clerk and Victoria, the Assistant Clerk were aware that the tradgey had happened some 80 yrears ago and were able to nominate this name for the new development in memory of those airmen who lost their lives in March 1941.

There you are - "What is in a name" can have alot of meaning to later generations...

Did you know? Glaziers Lane used to be called Bramble Lane

In its earlier days, Glaziers Lane was known as Bramble Lane, then Glaziers Lane. But when Wanborough Station was built in 1891 the road was made up by the Railway Company as far as the station and renamed Station Road, reverting to Glaziers Lane in the 1950s.

Helping out with BBC

Normandy Historians contributed to the BBC TV South broadcast from the new community shop just before Christmas. Alan Norris explained that the name Christmas Pie has no connection to the religious festival.

A prominent family named Christmas owned land in this locality and they can be traced back through old manorial records to the reign of King Henry VIII. 'Pie' is derived from the Saxon term 'pightel' meaning a small piece of arable land. Until the area was built up in the 1920s there was a small field called 'Pie Field' near the Christmas Pie crossroads.




